# PRESIDENTS REPORT

As we wrap up another incredible season, I am proud to reflect on the progress, achievements, and milestones we have reached together as a club in 2025. It has been a year of firsts, growth, and success – both on and off the field.

## **Club Growth and Team Success**

We fielded eight junior teams this season, reflecting the strength and depth of our club. A major highlight was the formation of our first-ever girls' team, launched through a successful partnership with Mooroolbark. This is a huge step forward in our commitment to inclusion and the future of girls' football at our club.

Our top three age groups held onto their A Grade standing from last season, after the grading games.

## **Finals hosting, Fundraising & Events**

This year, we were proudly selected again to host two EFNL finals, this displays spirit and club pride but also a huge success off the field, generating nearly \$17,000 in revenue. A massive thank you goes out to the volunteers who made these events run so smoothly.

We were fortunate to be able to run two Bunnings BBQ fundraisers which sizzled their way to almost \$2,000 in profit each. Our mid-season Music Trivia event was brilliant. We let our hair down and celebrated all things club footy. These moments remind us that sporting clubs are more than just about playing a game – they build community, connection and belonging.

## **Player Achievements**

On the field, our players continued to shine:

- League Best & Fairest Winner – Under 15s: A truly outstanding individual achievement. Mason Agnew

# TREASURER REPORT

The following Treasurer's Report provides a comprehensive overview of the financial activities and position of the Croydon Junior Football Club for the 2025 season. This report covers income, expenditure, assets, liabilities, and recommendations for the club's ongoing financial health. The purpose is to ensure transparency, inform members and stakeholders, and support continued growth and sustainability of the club.

## **Summary of Financial Position**

At year's end, the Croydon Junior Football Club remains financially stable. Prudent management and strong sponsorship and committee engagement have contributed to a positive cash flow.

## **Income Analysis**

- . Registration Fees remain a primary source of income, accounting for approximately 20% of total revenue. Registrations were steady this year, with strong growth in the Under 8 division. The club's commitment to affordable participation ensures accessibility for local families.
- . Sponsorships included McDonalds Croydon, Bubbas Pizza Croydon , Lilydale International, Fletchers Mooroolbark and ASI who supported the club with generous financial and non-financial contributions. Sponsorship revenue increased by 15% compared to last year, helped by new partnerships and successful engagement campaigns.
- . ANZAC / Indigenous round jumpers were proudly supported by, Mainframe Photography, Watershed Drainage, Whitehorse Industries, David Hodgett MP and Michael Sukkar MP and sales from these jumpers will be proudly donated.
- . Fundraising events included the annual Trivia Night, Bunnings sausage sizzles at the MCG and Bunnings Croydon and the annual raffle. Net proceeds from fundraising amounted to \$10,565.
- . Finals Hosting: Hosting of EFNL semifinal and preliminary finals generated total revenue of \$16,841.98 and a net profit of \$7,773.19.
- . Grants included the club successfully securing a Community Sport Grant from TAC round in 2024, totalling \$3,500, which helped cover costs for ground maintenance and other operating costs. The club has also now partnered with the Grant Professionals to assist with securing additional grants in 2026.
- . Canteen sales provided a steady income, with takings of \$28,000 for the year. This was achieved by ensuring the canteen open for more than 95% of games and regular review of sales and pricing.
- . Merchandise sales totalled \$8,736 for the year which moved to online ordering system to limit the amount of stock we keep on premise and avoid bulk buying requirements.
- . Other Income: Interest earned on Sandhurst Managed Fund contributed a further \$1,324 to the club's revenues.

## **Expenditure Analysis**

- . Facility Costs: Ground hire, utilities, and maintenance accounted for \$10,688 of expenses for the year.
- . Equipment Purchases: Footballs, training bibs, cones and other training equipment cost \$7,790. These investments support player safety and skill development.
- . Merchandise: Merchandise was our largest expense for the season at \$23,764 partially offset by sales, however most expenditure was for new players shorts, socks and training tops which were free with registration as well as some stock we hold for purchases throughout the year.

- . Insurance and EFNL Fees: Insurance premiums for scoreboard and EFNL association fees were \$13,133.
- . Club Event Costs: Expenditure for club events was \$16,559, which was offset through Club Event revenue for Back To Nights, Trivia night and Bunning BBQs.
- . Administrative Expenses: Office supplies, printing, website hosting, and postage totalled \$6,099.
- . Trophies: Annual medals and trophies for presentation day totalled \$2,957.59.

## **Assets and Liabilities**

- . Cash at Bank: The club finished the year with a cash balance of \$63,479.77, held in three accounts (Statement Account, Petty Cash Account and Sandhurst Managed Fund).
- . Equipment Assets: Sporting equipment is fully expensed each year, BBQ is currently value at \$590.93 and coffee machine at \$2,573.
- . Receivables: Outstanding sponsorship, Club Event sales and Raffle sales total \$5,230 expected to be settled early next season.
- . Liabilities: The club's liabilities consist mainly of supplier invoices for Anzac / Indigenous Round Donation (\$1,500), Presentation Day invoice (\$2,495) and other miscellaneous expenses (\$1,361.14), all to be paid in the next 30 days.

## **Financial Performance Against Budget**

The club's actual income exceeded expenses, closing with a total net profit of \$8,024.19 primarily due to increased sponsorship and successful fundraising. Expenditures were within budget, with minor overruns on merchandise costs which are expected to be recovered in the 2026 season. This strong performance will allow for additional investments in junior programs in the 2026 season.

## **Key Financial Initiatives and Outcomes**

- . Grant Acquisition: Successful application for TAC grant provided vital support for facility improvements and training equipment.
- . Revenue Diversification: Greater focus on sponsorship and canteen sales reduced reliance on registration income to cover core expenses.
- . Cost Management: Ongoing supplier renegotiations and volunteer support contributed to lower administrative and event expenses.

## **Challenges and Areas for Improvement**

- . Rising Facility and League Costs: Increased ground hire fees and EFNL fees remain a challenge. Continued focus on sponsorship and fundraising events required to ensure the club remains financial stable.
- . Membership Growth: While registrations are steady, ongoing support of our Auskick program is required to ensure future teams are fielded especially in the Under 8 program. Outreach efforts and partnerships with local schools will also be required to field older age groups as required.

- . Sponsorship Retention: Maintaining and growing sponsor relationships will be key to supporting future club initiatives.
- Recommendations for the Next Financial Year
- . Continue pursuing grant opportunities to supplement club income and support facility upgrades. The club has enlisted a grant specialist to put a stronger focus on grants.
- . Expand fundraising activities, including community events and online campaigns, to further diversify revenue streams.
- . Implement clear membership incentives and referral programs to boost enrolments, particularly in older age groups.
- . Strengthen sponsor relations with regular recognition, joint events, and improved visibility for business partners.
- . Review and renegotiate supplier contracts to achieve further cost savings where possible.
- . Expand development programs for all age groups to focus on skill development.

In summary, the Croydon Junior Football Club is in a healthy financial position and well placed to support its members and community into the next season. Wise stewardship of resources, strong volunteer involvement, and ongoing fundraising underpin the club's achievements this year. With continued focus on growth, inclusivity, and prudent financial management, the club remains committed to providing a safe, supportive, and vibrant environment for junior footballers in Croydon.

I respectfully submit this report for the Annual General Meeting and encourage all members to engage with the club's financial planning and future prospects.

# U10 COACHES REPORT

What a season of development this has been.

## **A Tough Start**

The year began slowly, with the kids finding it difficult to get their hands on the ball in the first few games. This led to some early losses and frustration for both players and coaches. But these challenges became the foundation for growth.

## **The Blue Wall**

We decided to implement some structure and introduced The Blue Wall. From that moment, everything changed. Oppositions struggled to move the ball out of our forward line, and suddenly the game was on our terms. I had my doubts about introducing this level of structure at such a young age, but the kids proved me wrong. What impressed me most was the emergence of little generals on the field—voices giving instructions, guiding teammates into position, and showing true leadership. Our vision is to build a team of leaders who can instill belief in one another, and we saw that come to life.

## **Building Confidence Through the Ruck**

Another key focus was using the ruck position to grow confidence. This turned out to be a huge success. Several players developed resilience and a willingness to compete, which carried over into every area of their game.

## **Game Development**

Our general gameplay was a highlight of the season. The kids began to run, link up, and play for each other. By the end of the year, we had sequences where we switched the ball, cleared contests with multiple hands, kicked into space for teammates to run onto, and hit targets on the lead. Most importantly, they had fun while doing it.

## **Positional Consistency**

We also adjusted how we rotated positions. Instead of cycling kids through forward, midfield, and backline in quick succession, we gave them half a game in one area and kept them there for a couple of weeks. This consistency allowed them to learn, settle, and grow—and the results were clear. We saw significant personal development and improvement across the group.

## A Special Moment

To cap off the season, there was a moment that showed just how special this team is. Oscar won a free kick in the goal square but chose to handball to Lincoln so he could kick his very first goal.
